**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

Jewish Care in Sydney utilized funds from HGT1 to provide homecare and case management to 14 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims. One of these clients resides in the countryside beyond Sydney's city limits. From October 2006 through June 2007, approximately 1,400 hours of chore services and housekeeping were provided. These hours enabled clients to safely remain in their homes, preventing isolation and institutionalization. Case managers helped clients access these critical in-home services, and provided additional support through implementation of comprehensive care plans and crisis intervention.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

With funds from HGT1, Jewish Care in Melbourne, Australia was able to provide 16 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims with a total of approximately 650 hours of personal care and chore services and during the period of April 2006 through March 2007. Two of these clients also received a total of 70 hours of respite care. In addition, 163 sessions of case management were provided to 61 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims between April 2006 and December 2006. Case managers conducted a comprehensive initial assessment for clients new to the agency in order to determine their needs and devise an appropriate care plan. The needs of all Jewish Hungarian Nazi victim clients were monitored by case managers on an ongoing basis, and care plans were adjusted when necessary as clients' physical health, mental health, and/or financial stability changed over time. Many clients received assistance in accessing Jewish Care's array of social services as well as in accessing the government benefits for which they were eligible.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

The Foundation for the Benefit of Holocaust Victims in Israel utilized funds from HGT1 to provide homecare and emergency assistance to needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims. Approximately 9 hours of homecare per week were provided to 99 clients. These hours were provided to clients that have impairments in 6 or more of their activities of daily living. Over 1,000 clients received individual grants toward medical and dental assistance, including help in purchasing hearing aides, dentures, eyeglasses, medication, and other essential items.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

Selfhelp Community Services utilized HGT funding to support case management in each of its locations around New York City. Case Managers worked with ongoing and newly identified Jewish Hungarian Nazi Victim clients. The professional case management staff assisted clients in completing applications for government entitlement programs and restitution programs. In addition, they provided counseling and made it possible for needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims to receive critical short term assistance through emergency grants and obtain ongoing benefits such as housing subsidies from the city (Section 8). In total 97 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims benefited from the assistance from Selfhelp case managers.
