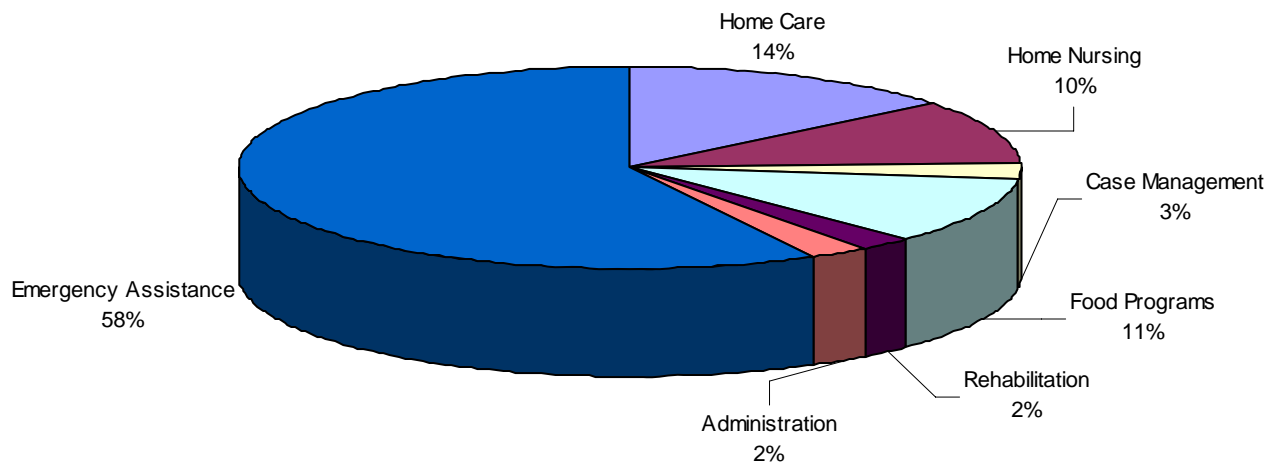
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Summary

This report contains financial and programmatic information on the provision of assistance to needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims by the nineteen social services agencies that fully utilized their first year allocations of the Hungarian Gold Train Program. Of the \$4.2 million allocated from the Special Fund for the first year of the Hungarian Gold Train Program, these nineteen agencies expended a total of \$2,107,652.07¹. Together, these agencies provided assistance to a total of 4,034 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims residing in twenty-four countries including: Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Croatia, Denmark, Germany, Hungary, Italy, New Zealand, Norway, Romania, Serbia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom, United States, Uruguay, and Venezuela.

The distribution of the expended funds is as follows:



Of the \$2,107,652.07 expended, approximately 58% (\$1,218,434.37) was utilized to provide short-term emergency assistance including assistance in purchasing essential medications, assistive devices, dental care, housing costs, and home care following hospitalization. In addition to the services Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims have been receiving on an ongoing basis, this short-term emergency financial assistance was essential in maintaining individuals in their homes through financial and medical crises that arose.

Approximately 14% of the expended funds (\$296,944.61) provided home care on an ongoing basis to 400 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims. These individuals received

assistance with a variety of household and personal tasks including cleaning, cooking, laundry, bathing, grooming, and dressing.

Home nursing was provided with 10% of the expended funds (\$209,748). In total, 429 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims received specialized medical assistance in their homes including physical therapy, monitoring of health conditions, and administering medications.

Hot home-delivered meals and food packages were provided on an ongoing basis to 889 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, comprising 11% of the funds expended worldwide (\$223,320.15).

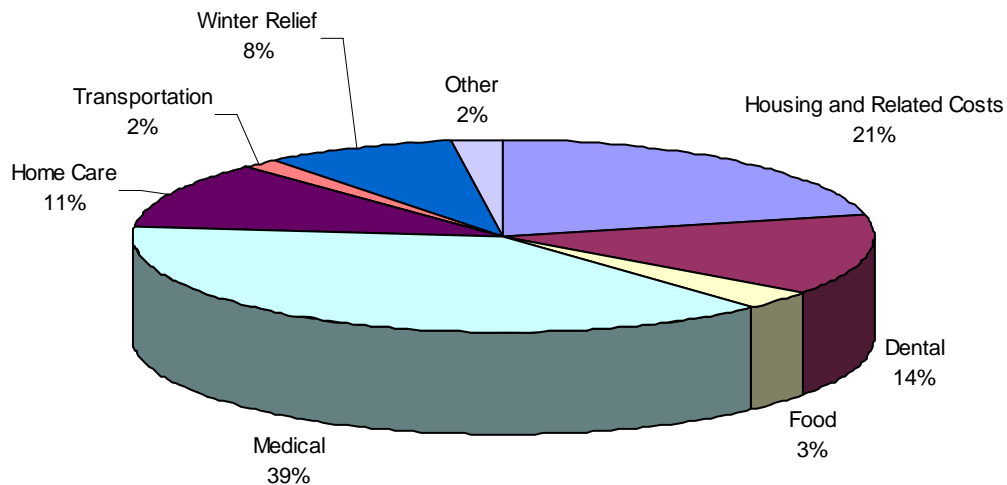
The remaining funds covered case management, rehabilitation, and program administration costs. With \$59,351.92 expended on case management worldwide (approximately 3% of the total amount expended), 367 clients received assistance. Case managers, most of whom spoke fluent Hungarian, assisted clients in completing applications for government entitlement programs and restitution programs, advocated on their clients' behalf in a range of situations, and provided much-needed counseling and ongoing support.

Rehabilitation was provided with 2% of the expended funds (\$47,670.00). One particular agency, the Hungarian Jewish Social Support Foundation in Budapest, used these funds to provide 291 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims with specialized physical therapy in order to improve their mobility following hospitalizations so that they could safely return to living independently in their own homes.

Program administration costs comprised approximately 2% of the total expenditures (\$52,183.02).

Emergency Assistance Program

Of the \$2,107,625.07 that was expended from the Special Fund first year allocation, a total of \$1,218,434.37 was utilized to provide emergency assistance to needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims. The breakdown of these expenditures is as follows:



The largest emergency need was for medical assistance, including help obtaining medications and essential treatments not covered by insurance, as well as assistance in purchasing assistive devices such as hearing aides, eye glasses, walkers, and wheelchairs. This medical assistance was provided to 1,864 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims worldwide. These medical services comprised approximately 39% of the emergency assistance funds expended (\$468,290.21).

Assistance for housing and related costs was provided to 420 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, comprising approximately 21% of the emergency assistance funds expended (\$260,100.08). Due to urgent financial and medical situations, these individuals required temporary assistance in paying monthly bills for rent and utilities. In addition, funds were needed for emergency repairs and to purchase essential household appliances.

Approximately 14% of the emergency assistance funds (\$166,092.17) provided dental care to 187 Nazi victims, and 11% of the funds (\$133,782.44) provided home care on a short-term basis to 204 Nazi victims, most of whom were recovering in their homes after serious medical procedures.

Approximately 8% of the funds expended on emergency assistance (\$102,455.00) were utilized toward winter relief. In total, 803 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims received financial assistance with expensive heating costs so that they could safely remain in their homes through the winter.

Food assistance was provided to 96 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, which comprised approximately 3% of the total expended on emergency assistance (\$41,192.08). This included home-delivered meals on a short-term basis and assistance in purchasing groceries. Transportation, primarily to and from medical appointments, was provided to 174 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, using 2% of the total funds expended on emergency assistance (\$20,011.03).

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

With funding from HGT1 a total of 3,881 hours of homecare were provided to 50 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims between January 2006 and December 2006. Homecare workers provided these clients with assistance in bathing, grooming, dressing, shopping, preparing meals, light housekeeping, and laundry. In some cases homecare workers escorted clients to doctor's appointments and on other daily errands. Homecare workers also provided respite to caregivers by attending to the clients' needs and providing the caregiver with a few free hours per week.

For 15 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, HGT1 funds provided a total of 2,716 meals between January 2006 and December 2006. These meals were delivered by volunteers directly to the clients' homes. Many of these clients had recently been released from the hospital and were not mobile and healthy enough to cook for themselves.

These services, together with the emergency assistance program, provided significant support to needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims allowing them to continue to live independently in their homes throughout Toronto.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

The Cummings Jewish Centre for Seniors (CJCS) used HGT funding to hire a part-time Hungarian-speaking case manager. During this case manager's first quarter working at CJCS, she was in contact with over 70 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims. The majority of these clients were new to the agency and had not received any services prior to the HGT settlement. Furthermore, many of these clients were living alone and trying to manage severe health problems on their own with limited finances and language skills, leaving them highly vulnerable. The case manager was able to intervene in order to ensure that they received the in-home support services necessary to ensure their safety such as providing personal care, transportation to doctor's appointments, and installing emergency alert systems. In addition, she was able to coordinate between Hungarian-speaking clients and English- and French-speaking service providers (i.e. dentists, doctors, audiologists) in order to help the clients understand the procedures required and to ensure that they received the most essential treatments and/or assistive devices at the lowest possible cost.

In one particular case, the case manager provided support to an 80-year-old mentally ill client who had been living with his terminally ill brother. Once his brother was placed in a long-term care facility, the client was left living alone and required assistance with many daily activities. The HGT case manager, working in conjunction with a social worker at the Public Health Department, made sure that the client received hot home-delivered meals, homecare, and assisted transportation so that he can safely remain at home while he awaits placement at the long-term care facility in which his brother resides.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

A total of 321 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims received homecare services with HGT1 funding between January 2006 and December 2006. Of these 321 clients, 77 socially isolated Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims benefited from a specialized cleaning service. Another 244 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims received 21,089 hours of housekeeping and personal care services including help with household activities such as housework, shopping, and cooking as well as assistance in bathing, dressing, eating, and accompaniment to doctors' appointments. These workers also provided respite for caregivers. Home health aides worked with clients to ensure that they follow their doctors' directions, take their medicine properly and keep track of their prescriptions.

HGT1 allowed 429 needy Hungarian Nazi victims to receive 13,983 hours of home nursing between January 2006 and December 2006. Clients received an average of three visits per week for a period of 26 weeks. This program strives to prevent or minimize hospitalization by carrying out rehabilitation and physical therapy in the home. Physical therapists help frail Nazi victims strengthen their bodies with regular therapy, exercise and the use of muscle-nerve stimulators. In addition, medical nurses help clients take their medication, bathe, and move around their apartments according to each client's individually-tailored nursing strategy. This service is essential for clients who are returning home after serious medical procedures.

With funding from HGT1 a total of 834 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims received food assistance between January 2006 and December 2006, including hot Kosher meals and dry food packages. The Foundation was able to provide 11,333 hot Kosher meals to 155 clients who cannot cook for themselves and 1,029 dry food packages to the 679 clients who are still able to cook. The hot Kosher meals are delivered daily to clients throughout the country. The dry food packages, delivered once every two months, include basic staples such as potatoes, rice, oil, vegetables and fruit.

For 291 needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims HGT1 provided rehabilitation in the respite center in Balatonfüred. The post-hospitalization rehabilitation services offered by this center allow clients to rehabilitate for seven days away from the stresses and hazards of their daily living conditions. These services are not covered by health insurance.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

The Jewish Community of Stockholm Social Department (STSD) staff worked closely with Jewish Hungarian Nazi victim clients in Sweden, and connected with Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims and social service professionals in communities worldwide. From January 2006 through December 2006, STSD staff coordinated the provision of emergency assistance to needy Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims residing in 20 countries including: Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Chile, Costa Rica, Croatia, Denmark, Germany, Italy, New Zealand, Norway, Serbia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Uruguay, and Venezuela. STSD staff liaised with local professionals in all of these countries to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment for each applicant and then presented recommendations to the Hungarian Survivor Advisory Committee in Stockholm, who made the final determination.

For Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims residing in Sweden, STSD case management staff ensured that clients had access to the full array of social services provided by the agency as well as the government. Clients' needs were monitored by STSD case managers on an ongoing basis, and care plans were adjusted when necessary as clients' physical health, mental health, and/or financial stability changed over time.

**Additional Information on the Implementation of the
Hungarian Gold Train Program**

Pesach Tikvah and UJO provided a total of 1,704 hours of homecare to 29 Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims using funds from HGT1 between April 2006 and December 2006. Forty clients received a total of 3,076 hot home-delivered meals from HGT1 funds. A part-time case manager was able to provide a total of 173 sessions of case management to 46 clients, averaging between 2.5 to 3 hours per session.

In addition to coordinating homecare services and meal delivery for Jewish Hungarian Nazi victims, the case manager was able to arrange for volunteers to visit homebound and isolated clients. Several of these clients have been widowed, do not have children, and may be suffering from severe health problems or a terminal illness. In one instance where a client was suffering from serious depression, the case manager coordinated professional psychiatric care for the client as well as visitors who could provide social support. The case manager also provided extensive resources and assistance as many clients applied for SSI, Medicaid, Medicare Part D, and Holocaust restitution.



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
